SETTING GROUP EXPECTATIONS

The directions below have been taken from Ruth Haley Barton's Book, Sacred Rhythms. They provide a great framework for setting the posture of how the group makes space for each other and what the expectations are. On the sheet attached, write down any additional expectations/ values/ norms your group would like to highlight, add, or prioritize.

- "Guide the group in making the following basic commitments as they journey together (if needed, encourage them to add any other values or commitments that will increase their sense of willingness to commit themselves to the group):
- We will be faithful engage with the material.
- We will support and pray for one another as we each explore what wholeheartedness looks like in our lives and respond faithfully to God's invitations along the way.
- We will respect each other's personal relationship with God understanding that each person's relationship with God takes place at God's initiative and within his leading and control.
- We will create and maintain a safe environment for questions and wondering. This means we will listen rather than fix and ask questions rather than give answers.
- We will seek to increase our self-awareness and be appropriately self-disclosing respecting our own boundaries and those of others.
- We will pay particular attention to the times and ways in which God is moving in each person's life and seek to affirm evidence of each person's growth and transformation.
- We will honor confidentiality*. What is shared in the group stays in the group!

Remember that the focus is on transformation, not information. Closing your time with prayer that celebrates what God is doing in each person's life and affirms each person's spiritual desire and intent for the week to come is an important way of "gathering up" all that has been shared and entrusting it to God."

*Leaders concerned with harm to self or others (or by others) will need to report this to a Pastor.

They can be from the list on the left as well as things your group decides on and AGREES on together. (Ex. being on time... praying for each other... allowing for silence... etc.)

Each week we ask that you **read all 6 chapters of Ephesians.** The reading outline below shows you which of the six to focus on for that week. We are asking you to read the whole book weekly so that we are always reading the chaptering in context of the whole letter.

Week 3: Ephesians 2, N.T. Wright chapters 3 & 4

Week 5: Ephesians 4, N.T. Wright chapters 7 & 8

Week 6: Ephesians 5, N.T. Wright chapters 9 & 10

Week 7: Ephesians 6, N.T. Wright chapters 11

Week 8: Conclusion

*Reading along with the N.T. Write Commentary is optional. If you choose, just follow along with the corresponding chapter in Ephesians for that week.

WRITING EPHESIANS

Verse Breakdown for those who would like to take up the practice of writing out the letter to the Ephesians over the 8 weeks we will be meeting. Writing out scripture interrupts our quick reading and makes us slow down and notice things which might not have otherwise stood out. This practice is optional, though encouraged.

SMALL GROUP DISCUSSION FORMAT/ GUIDE

WEEKLY PATTERN FOR DISCUSSION

OPENING QUESTIONS: Connecting Personally

1. Use a few minutes at the beginning of your time to follow up on any action items shared from last week.

- Was there a next step or application challenge that they took on this past week? What did they learn about themselves and following Jesus?
- 2. Set a time for one minute per person. Then go around and share on **one** of the bullet points:
 - Your highs and lows for the week.
 - Who was a hero to you this week? (who made your week a bit better or was a blessing to you?)
 - What stands out as a place, time, or person where you noticed God in your week?

SCRIPTURE DISCUSSION

Leaders: Before small group, choose 3-4 questions from the study guide per section that you want to be sure to get to.

- 1. Read the chapter aloud or individually (depending on group preference).
- 2. Passage Overview (note on newsprint)

As a group make some quick broad notes on scratch paper (5-10 Minutes). You don't need to go deep into these themes, but have people share single words/ ideas/ bullets to get some ideas down before you begin.

- What words or themes did you notice in your reading?
- What stood out to you from the reading this week?
- Was there anything surprising... new... challenging...?
- What questions that came up as you read this passage?
- What is the main point of the passage for this week?

2. Discuss Workbook Questions

• Work through the questions in the work book. Use at least 3-4 questions per section.

3. Application

- How does this passage inform how we understand God, each other, and ourselves.
- What does this passage tell you about God's character, Jesus, life as a Christian, or Scripture?
- What was life-giving? Share about why that is.
- What were the connections between the Biblical narrative and your life today?
- What might God be inviting you to do/pray/consider through this week's reading? Is there a common thread you are noticing that is standing out to you?



Having a plan for how you will engage with scripture can be very useful when looking at a passage. There is no perfect tool, but they cal all highlight different aspects of scripture.

There is a simple framework of the 5C's and then a great resource which was created and used by Intervarsity.

SCRIPTURE STUDY: 5Cs

If you are interested in studying the scripture more deeply, one method is to use the 5 Cs. Read through the passage and move through each C. The goal is not to move through them quickly, but to really consider each section. If you wanted to study the passage together, you, as the leader should take some time beforehand to complete the Cs and it can be helpful to have group members come prepared with the first 3 already considered. Then, as a group, you can briefly talk over some of the points and have a longer conversation about curiosities and conclusions. This study tool will be posted within all of the discussion questions.

- **Context:** What is the literary context of the passage? What comes before? After? Context within whole book? Relation to main idea of section, book, testament, whole Bible?
- Christ: How is Jesus revealed here? If in OT, prefiguration, typology, prophesy, implications for Christ's person and work? How is he needed, anticipated, fulfilled?
- **Crux:** What is the main idea? Try and find a section of the text that states it and have reasons for why that is the main idea? How do the other points support it?
- Curiosities: What is surprising about this text? Controversial? Mysterious? Shocking?
- Conclusions: What are the implications for our lives? Application? How do we think, feel, and act in light of this text?

READING GUIDES

Weekly Space for notes as you read



Use what works for you! Scripture is followed by the reflection Chart so you can easily read and take notes in the margins or the grid.

Reflection Charts

Use the following charts as they are helpful for keeping track of what stands out to you as you read Ephesians. As the weeks go on, you might begin to see connections and themes emerge as you look back on your notes. Below are some tips for using this section.

This portion is the same for each week. There is no need to hurry or do this all in one day. You can use the guidelines below as you read each passage. We suggest a regular rhythm of reflecting on these areas 3-5 times a week. You can reflect on one section per sitting as a way of slowing down. Do what works best for you. This tool is designed to help you settle in and have an authentic interaction with Jesus about your life. Write down or doodle your response to God. Don't strive for the right or perfect responses. After reflecting on the different categories, review your notes on the page, are there themes or questions you notice about your time reflecting in this way on the passage for the week?

DESCRIPTION OF CHART HEADINGS

- Repeated words: As you read, highlight words and themes that stand out or continue to come up
- Curiosities: What stands out as intriguing or makes you think, "Huh! Interesting ... "
- **5 Senses:** Is there anything added to your understanding of your experience of this passages when you think about it as if you were there? Are there sights, sounds, feelings, tastes, smells, sensations which inform this passage?
- **Invitations:** Is there something that God might be promoting you about as you read? What might God's invitation to you be?
- Questions: What questions are coming?
- Main Point/s: What do you see as the main point/s of this passage?

PREPARATION/ QUIETING MIND & HEART

- Prepare yourself to notice and listen. Offer your distracting thoughts and hurry to God. Take some deep breaths.
- Read the passage once through at a normal pace, then once more through slowly. Reading out loud can slow your mind down and help you notice.
- What words or phrases light up for you as you read the passage today?



Ephesians 1: Spiritual Blessings in Christ

A beautiful introduction to how we have received every spiritual blessing in Christ Jesus. We have been adopted to sonship, we have been chosen, forgiven and redeemed. We have been marked with a seal and given the Holy Spirit as a down payment of our inheritance. Then Paul prays that we will have the revelation of Christ so we can know the hope and power we have been called to as His body, the Church of whom He is the head.

Ephesians 2: Made Alive in Christ

Starts with a reminder of God's great love for us, that even when we were dead, Christ made us alive in Him. We have been raised and seated with Christ in heaven and all of this comes by His Grace that we receive through faith. Paul then reminds us that Christ has made one Church out of those who had the covenant (Jews) and those who were hopeless and without God (Gentiles) and reconciled both to God through the work of the cross. Now we have access to the same God and the Holy Spirit lives in us.

Ephesians 3: The Mystery of Christ

Opens with the mystery of Christ made known through revelation by the Spirit of God. That through the gospel, Gentiles are heirs together with Israel, members of one body and partakers in the promise of Christ Jesus. Paul states his mission as an apostle to the Gentiles is to preach the administration of this mystery now revealed. Paul ends this chapter with a powerful prayer for believers to know and experience the love of God and to be filled to full measure of God according to the power that now lives in us.

Ephesians 4: Unity in the Body of Christ

Reminds us to live a life worthy of the calling we have received in Christ Jesus. We are called to unity as a body of believers through one Lord, one Spirit, and one hope. God has given us apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers to prepare God's people for works of service so the body of Christ may be built up and obtain the whole measure of the fullness of Christ. We are reminded to put on the new self created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.

Ephesians 5: Be Imitators of God

Emphasizes that we are to be imitators of God and live a life of love because Christ gave himself up for us as a sacrifice to God. We are to put away sexual immorality, impurity, greed, and foolish talk as it is improper for God's holy people. We are to live as children of light and find out what pleases the Lord. We are to make use of every opportunity, to understand the Lord's will, and to be filled with the Spirit. Paul reminds us to give thanks for God in all things and submit to one another out of reverence for Christ. The chapter ends with instructions for husbands and wives, which illustrates the profound mystery of Christ and the Church.

Ephesians 6: The Armor of God

Picks up immediately with instructions to children, parents, slaves*, and masters. Paul gives practical instructions on how to relate well with others in whatever position* you are in life. As final instructions in this letter Paul uses the illustration of a soldier to show how we have been equipped as believers. We are to be strong in the Lord and put on this armor to withstand the devil's schemes, as our struggle is against spiritual forces in this dark world. Paul ends this letter with an administration of grace and peace to all who love our Lord Jesus Christ.

EPHESIANS, CHAPTER 1 (NIV)

1 Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God,

To God's holy people in Ephesus, the faithful in Christ Jesus:

2 Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Praise for Spiritual Blessings in Christ

3 Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. 4 For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love 5 he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will- 6 to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves. 7 In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace 8 that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and understanding, 9 he made known to us the mystery of his will according to his good pleasure, which he purposed in Christ, 10 to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfi llment-to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ.

11 In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, **12** in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory. **13** And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, **14** who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory.

Thanksgiving and Prayer **15** For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, **16** I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. **17** I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. **18** I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, **19** and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength **20** he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, **21** far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that is invoked, not only in the present age but also in the one to come. **22** And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, **23** which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

EPHESIANS, CHAPTER 2 (NIV)

Made Alive in Christ

2 As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, 2 in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. 3 All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our fl esh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath.
4 But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, 5 made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved. 6 And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, 7 in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. 8 For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—9 not by works, so that no one can boast. 10 For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

Jew and Gentile Reconciled Through Christ

11 Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called "uncircumcised" by those who call themselves "the circumcision" (which is done in the body by human hands)–

12 remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world. **13** But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

14 For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, **15** by setting aside in his fl esh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, **16** and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility.

17 He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. **18** For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

19 Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household, **20** built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. **21** In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. **22** And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

EPHESIANS, CHAPTER 3 (NIV)

God's Marvelous Plan for the Gentiles

1 For this reason I, Paul, the prisoner of Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles-

2 Surely you have heard about the administration of God's grace that was given to me for you, 3 that is, the mystery made known to me by revelation, as I have already written briefly. 4 In reading this, then, you will be able to understand my insight into the mystery of Christ, 5 which was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed by the Spirit to God's holy apostles and prophets. 6 This mystery is that through the gospel the Gentiles are heirs together with Israel, members together of one body, and sharers together in the promise in Christ Jesus.

7 I became a servant of this gospel by the gift of God's grace given me through the working of his power. 8 Although I am less than the least of all the Lord's people, this grace was given me: to preach to the Gentiles the boundless riches of Christ, 9 and to make plain to everyone the administration of this mystery, which for ages past was kept hidden in God, who created all things. 10 His intent was that now, through the church, the manifold wisdom of God should be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly realms, 11 according to his eternal purpose that he accomplished in Christ Jesus our Lord. 12 In him and through faith in him we may approach God with freedom and confi dence. 13 I ask you, therefore, not to be discouraged because of my sufferings for you, which are your glory.

A Prayer for the Ephesians

14 For this reason I kneel before the Father, **15** from whom every family[a] in heaven and on earth derives its name. **16** I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, **17** so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, **18** may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, **19** and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

20 Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, **21** to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.

EPHESIANS, CHAPTER 4 (NIV)

Unity and Maturity in the Body of Christ

4 As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. **2** Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. **3** Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. **4** There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; **5** one Lord, one faith, one baptism; **6** one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.**7** But to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it. **8** This is why it says:"When he ascended on high, he took many captives and gave gifts to his people."

9 (What does "he ascended" mean except that he also descended to the lower, earthly regions? **10** He who descended is the very one who ascended higher than all the heavens, in order to fill the whole universe.) **11** So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, **12** to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up **13** until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ. **14** Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming. **15** Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. **16** From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

Instructions for Christian Living

17 So I tell you this, and insist on it in the Lord, that you must no longer live as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their thinking.
18 They are darkened in their understanding and separated from the life of God because of the ignorance that is in them due to the hardening of their hearts.
19 Having lost all sensitivity, they have given themselves over to sensuality so as to indulge in every kind of impurity, and they are full of greed.
20 That, however, is not the way of life you learned
21 when you heard about Christ and were taught in him in accordance with the truth that is in Jesus.
22 You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires;
23 to be made new in the attitude of your minds;
24 and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.

25 Therefore each of you must put off falsehood and speak truthfully to your neighbor, for we are all members of one body. **26** "In your anger do not sin": Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry, **27** and do not give the devil a foothold. **28** Anyone who has been stealing must steal no longer, but must work, doing something useful with their own hands, that they may have something to share with those in need. **29** Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen. **30** And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. **31** Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. **32** Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

EPHESIANS, CHAPTER 5 (NIV)

1 Follow God's example, therefore, as dearly loved children **2** and walk in the way of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

3 But among you there must not be even a hint of sexual immorality, or of any kind of impurity, or of greed, because these are improper for God's holy people. **4** Nor should there be obscenity, foolish talk or coarse joking, which are out of place, but rather thanksgiving. **5** For of this you can be sure: No immoral, impure or greedy person–such a person is an idolater–has any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God. **6** Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of such things God's wrath comes on those who are disobedient. **7** Therefore do not be partners with them.

8 For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light 9 (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth) 10 and find out what pleases the Lord.
11 Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness, but rather expose them. 12 It is shameful even to mention what the disobedient do in secret. 13 But everything exposed by the light becomes visible–and everything that is illuminated becomes a light. 14 This is why it is said:

"Wake up, sleeper, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you."

15 Be very careful, then, how you live-not as unwise but as wise, 16 making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. 17 Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord's will is. 18 Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit,
19 speaking to one another with psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit. Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord, 20 always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Instructions for Christian Households

21 Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ. 22 Wives, submit yourselves to your own husbands as you do to the Lord. 23 For the husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, his body, of which he is the Savior. 24 Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit to their husbands in everything. 25 Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her 26 to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, 27 and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless. 28 In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. 29 After all, no one ever hated their own body, but they feed and care for their body, just as Christ does the church – 30 for we are members of his body. 31 "For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one fl esh."[c] 32 This is a profound mystery–but I am talking about Christ and the church. 33 However, each one of you also must love his wife as he loves himself, and the wife must respect her husband.

EPHESIANS, CHAPTER 6

1Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 2 "Honor your father and mother"–which is the first commandment with a promise– 3 "so that it may go well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth."

4 Fathers, do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord.

5 Slaves, obey your earthly masters with respect and fear, and with sincerity of heart, just as you would obey Christ. **6** Obey them not only to win their favor when their eye is on you, but as slaves of Christ, doing the will of God from your heart. **7** Serve wholeheartedly, as if you were serving the Lord, not people, **8** because you know that the Lord will reward each one for whatever good they do, whether they are slave or free.

9 And masters, treat your slaves in the same way. Do not threaten them, since you know that he who is both their Master and yours is in heaven, and there is no favoritism with him. The Armor of God

10 Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. 11 Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. 12 For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms. 13 Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. 14 Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, 15 and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. 16 In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the fl aming arrows of the evil one. 17 Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

18 And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. **19** Pray also for me, that whenever I speak, words may be given me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel, **20** for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it fearlessly, as I should. Final Greetings

21 Tychicus, the dear brother and faithful servant in the Lord, will tell you everything, so that you also may know how I am and what I am doing. **22** I am sending him to you for this very purpose, that you may know how we are, and that he may encourage you.

23 Peace to the brothers and sisters,[c] and love with faith from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. **24** Grace to all who love our Lord Jesus Christ with an undying love.
